NAPLAN

Over the last two weeks, students in Years 3 and 5 have been undertaking NAPLAN Assessments during our morning literacy sessions. Students have each demonstrated patience and persistence throughout these four assessments (reading, writing, language conventions and numeracy) which they should all be very proud of. These online assessments will be marked externally, with reports sent home to parents later in the year. Whilst these assessments are just one test taken on one day, they allow staff to triangulate the data with other assessments and are used to identify where students are currently at and how we can support them as a school to move forward. On Monday 18th March, students were treated to an incredible educational talk on amphibians, reptiles and mammals (amongst other things).
